Editor's choice Modular continuous stirred tank reactor (CSTR) for flow chemistry systems

Vapourtec's modular continuous stirred tank reactor (CSTR) is designed to integrate with its existing E-Series and R-Series flow chemistry systems.

The CSTRs can be used in a cascade under continuous flow conditions.

Each reactor has a reactor volume of up to 40ml and operates within a temperature range of -10°C to +150°C. The systems operate at pressures up to 5 bar, which allows solvents to be heated well beyond normal reflux temperatures.

The availability of a photochemical light source allows the CSTRs to also undertake photochemical reactions whilst in continuous flow.

Each LED module has an input power of 70W delivering a radiant power up to 40W. The LEDs are dimmable in the range



10% to 100% of maximum power, with wavelengths between 365nm and 700nm.

The LED module can be attached in seconds and requires no tools. Either one or two LED CSTRs can be powered from one standard Vapourtec UV-150 LED power supply.

Vapourtec founder Duncan Guthrie explained: 'In some applications, cascades of CSTRs can be the most practical way of scaling continuous flow processes.

'The key benefit of a CSTR cascade over a tubular or plug flow reactor is the ability to handle solid reagents, solid by-products or even crystallised solid products,' Guthrie added.


